#### From the Rector

The last edition of *The Bridge* neatly covered the four weeks or so of Advent and the 40 days of the Christmas season until Candlemas. Because of this year's early Easter, the February/ March edition spans Lent and Easter. Just as there is never a dull moment in meteorological seasons, the Church's seasons change at a pace too.

<sup>30</sup> My eyes have seen your salvation,

<sup>31</sup> which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

<sup>32</sup> a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel. *Luke 2: 30-32* 

Candlemas (2<sup>nd</sup> February) ends the time when we remember Jesus' birth. However, through the Song of Simeon (see Luke 2), we also look forward to Jesus' rejection and towards the rapidly approaching season of Lent.

The Lord is full of compassion and mercy, slow to anger and of great kindness. *Psalm 103.8* 

Lent, our preparation for the sadness then joy of Easter, begins with Ash Wednesday. Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence; from the Middle Ages it became the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The story of Jesus's death on the Cross, his Passion, is read on the fifth Sunday, giving it its name of Passion Sunday.

In early church history, the *Pascha* was a night-long vigil, followed by the celebration of the Eucharist at cock-crow – it included all the great Easter themes: incarnation, suffering, death, resurrection, glorification. Today, by participating in the whole sequence of Easter services, we too can share in Christ's journey, from his triumphal entry into

Jerusalem (Palm Sunday) to the empty tomb on Easter morning.

Maundy Thursday has the key themes: humble Christian service (Christ washing the disciples' feet), the institution of the Eucharist, and Christ's loving obedience through the agony of Gethsemane.

After keeping vigil ('Could you not watch with me one hour?'), Thursday passes into Good Friday with the ancient veneration of the Cross - and the 19<sup>th</sup> Century *Devotion Meditations*. There is no celebration of the Eucharist on Good Friday, rather consecrated bread from Maundy Thursday is given in communion. The church remains stripped and without liturgy: there can be no adequate way of recalling the dead Son of God, other than silence and desolation. However, within the silence, a sense of peace and completion grows.

From earliest times, Christians have gathered through Easter night to recall the story of God's saving work, from creation to the resurrection. Thus, the Easter liturgy becomes an experience of new life in the passing from darkness into light. The Easter vigil marks the end of the emptiness of Holy Saturday, and leads into the celebration of Christ's resurrection on Easter Day – Alleluia! All the resources of the church – music, flowers, bells, colours – are used to celebrate Christ's resurrection. The *Alleluia*, absent throughout Lent, returns.

Now the queen of seasons, bright with the day of splendour, with the royal feast of feasts, comes its joy to render. (John of Damascus)

## St Mary & All Saints, Droxford Easter Offering

As is customary, since collections at Easter ceased to be part of the rector's salary, St Mary & All Saints Easter Day collection will go to support the clergy. The offering is split equally between the Clergy Pension Fund and St Luke's Healthcare for the Clergy. Through the use of honorary consultants, St Luke's helps minimise the time clergy are away from their parishioners for medical reasons. The charity also works with dioceses to strengthen the health of clergy, in particular the effects of stress. A new development is partnership with Burrswood Christian Hospital. This assists those in frontline ministry to receive therapeutic treatment in sympathetic and restful surroundings.

## St Andrew's and Corhampton churches

The year 2015 ended with a very busy December, with all the celebrations leading up to Christmas. We would like to thank everyone who decorated the churches so beautifully, and Meonstoke School for their stunning Nativity scene. They were the backdrop to all our Christmas services and much admired.

At the beginning of December, we had a Toy service. Kind people donated a whole car boot full of toys for the children of women living in a Portsmouth Women's Refuges (3 centres and many individual houses). Then followed the traditional Christingle service, organised with Meonstoke School. On Christmas Eve, there was a Scratch Nativity - new to all of us, and a must for your 2016 diary. The simple message was conveyed by some budding actors - even a bemused Joseph, who found himself with two wives, rose to the occasion. St Andrew's was filled on Christmas Day with people wanting to celebrate the birth of Christ - it was a real and vibrant community celebration. At all these services collections were taken and people gave very generously to the Children's Society, Tear Fund and the Church Army – thank you all so very much.

Also in December, the newly formed Friends of St Andrews and Corhampton received their new constitution. It is hoped that this new organisation

will enable us to work together with our two communities to safeguard the fabric of both our churches. To celebrate this new organisation, the Friends organised a Christmas lunch at the Bucks Head for some of our elderly, their carers and some Community Care drivers. Our sincere thanks go to Nicky and her family, who looked after everyone so well. It is hope to have a midsummer celebration, with the surplus of the community grant.

We are also looking forward to an early Easter and Her Majesty the Queen's Birthday thanksgiving.

At the next PCC meeting in March, we will choose a Planned Giving Scheme. We hope that our generous congregation will be able to commit enough money to cover the cost of our ministry. We also hope that the whole community will continue its invaluable support for all that we plan to do, not least have a full time benefice priest for baptisms, weddings, and funerals. Our aim is to ensure that we can run our beautiful ancient churches for everyone with the funds we generate, so that our work and our buildings are here for the generations to come.

## In the garden

February & March

affodils and snowdrops in December!! It has been another unseasonably warm December and for most of us very wet too. Unfortunately, these conditions are ideal for pests to overwinter successfully, so vigilance for aphids and snail/slug eggs is needed so that they can be dealt with appropriately.

As soon as the soil is workable, priority should be given to getting bare rooted trees, shrubs and fruit canes planted while they are still dormant. It is also time to give the vegetable plot a final dig over before preparing for sowing.

**Vegetables**: Early sowings of broad beans, peas, and parsnips may be made, and shallot sets planted. At this time, early sowings of spring onions and lettuce may also be made. A layer of fleece will provide some protection against frost, mice and birds.

Fruit: Shorten canes of summer fruiting raspberries to 5 feet and tie in to supporting wires. Newly planted canes should be cut back to between 4 and 6 inches. In mid-February, cut autumn fruiting varieties down to ground level. Prune gooseberries, white and red currants – cut back half of last year's new growth and trim side shoots to about 2 inches. Ensure that there are no crossing branches and that there is plenty of space for air to circulate in the bushes. Remove all wood 4 years old or more from black currant bushes (these stems will be very dark in colour). Sprinkle some balanced fertiliser around the base of fruit trees and bushes before applying a mulch of well-rotted manure.

Herbaceous border: Clean up dead leaves and stems which may harbour unwanted pests, and complete any transplanting not done in the autumn. Plant roses and hardy lilies; plant gladioli after mid-March; prune climbing roses and hardy shrubs. Do NOT prune forsythia and other spring flowering shrubs or spring flowering clematis such as montana, alpina, or armandii, otherwise there will be no flowers this year. Apply mulch of composted horse manure around shrubs.

**Lawns**: In March, re-seed worn areas after first levelling; repair any damaged edges and aerate the whole lawn with an aerator or fork. At the end of the month apply lawn fertiliser and after a few

days lightly mow, remembering to set the mower blades high so that the grass is not cut too short. If there has been a build-up of perennial weeds and moss since the autumn use proprietary weed and feed with moss killer.

In the greenhouse: Sow tomato, sprouts, cauliflower and summer bedding annuals such as petunia, tagetes, asters and nicotiana. Start tuberous rooted begonias in pots or trays, start dahlias in trays of slightly damp peat or soil-free compost. Chit early potato tubers, eyes uppermost in shallow boxes of sand, ready for planting out in mid-March. Start watering dormant overwintered fuchsias and pelargoniums to kickstart them into growth.

Meonstoke Village Archives: A safe dry cupboard has been allocated in The Meon Hall's crypt meeting room for the temporary collection and storage of recent parish archives and historic information that is still relevant to the present day, before eventually being sent off to the County Records Office in Winchester. The collection thus far has come from offerings by residents, from various attics, cupboards, trunks, and desk drawers, etc, in their houses. The cupboard includes

- Significant parish council papers going back to the 1930's;
- Parochial Church Council papers about the restorations of Corhampton Saxon Church in 1990, and St. Andrew's in 2004;
- Church fête records back to the 1990's,
- The Women's Institute's branch minute book records from 1929 to around 1999:
- The minute books and accounts of the Meon Hut village hall in Meonstoke High Street from 1919 to 1976;
- Records and accounts of The Meon Hall building committee 1976 to 1981 with photograph albums and Ian Allured's book From Hut to Hall, 1981;
- Extensive digital records of materials and personal interviews of the village and people made by Marcia Gillespie and Liz Borrow from HM The

- Queen's Coronation, Silver Jubilee 1977, and Diamond Jubilee 2012 celebrations
- The CD of Michael Kinsman's video A Portrait of a Village A Year in the Life of Meonstoke 1995-96.

Also in the crypt meeting room is the large framed 1930's District Air Raid Precaution OS map scale 6 inches: 1 mile showing the Second World War village Fire Watch Zones and names of the villagers who volunteered in 1939-1942; the map shows our valley's ARP organization which was managed from the Droxford Union building.

It would be helpful to include copies, please, of the following books by Meonstoke writers and historians if any copies are available: *Meonstoke and Soberton – some chapters in their history*, 1978, Frances Collins and Rev John Hurst; *Personal Memories of Corhampton & Meonstoke between the Wars*, Elsie Munro, 2001; *The Life and Times of Edward Trigg, A Meonstoke Man 1917 - 2010*; and *Corhampton and Exton*, by Rev John Hurst 1980.

## The Royal British Legion

Droxford & District Branch



t our first meeting of 2016, the Branch enjoyed a very informative and thought-provoking talk by Captain Paul Porter and Lieutenant-

Commander James Clarke from the Defence Science and Technology Laboratory (DSTL). Entitled Robots, Lasers and print your own ship – is this

the future of the Royal Navy?, our visitors brought us up-to-date with the current role and capabilities of the modern navy. The role has changed little over time but, as a major trading nation and 5<sup>th</sup> largest world economy with 95% of our trade conducted by sea, the Strategic Defence and Security Review 2015 (SDSR 15) rightly refocussed attention on Britain's maritime capability. This gives the UK flexibility, ranging from soft diplomacy (including foreign visits and cocktail parties!) through to counter-piracy and warfighting itself. Although small in comparison with the past - Admiral Cunningham had as many major warships at Matapan alone than in the entire Royal Navy of today - the UK Fleet still packs a powerful punch with the world-beating Type 45 destroyer and aging but powerful Type 23 frigate providing the main workforce of 19 escorts. With an already capable amphibious group to deploy 3 Commando Brigade Royal Marines, our offensive capability will shortly be

### 75 years ago...

Between 26th and 29th March 1941, elements of the British Mediterranean Fleet commanded by C-in-C, Admiral Sir Andrew Cunningham (see note) flying his flag in the battleship HMS WARSPITE defeated an Italian force off Cape Matapan. British and Australian warships, and aircraft of the Royal Air Force and Fleet Air Arm sank 3 Italian cruisers and 4 destroyers for the loss of only one aircraft. Following the victory at Taranto in November 1940, this action led to the virtual elimination of the Italian surface fleet as a major threat to the Allies. 3 British aircrew and over 2,300 Italian sailors perished.

considerably enhanced by 2 large aircraft carriers, principally to operate the new Lightning F35B strike fighter. With these and many other vital equipment projects such as new maritime patrol aircraft; replacement frigates, submarines, and auxiliaries; development of unmanned ships, aircraft, and submersibles; robots and Laser technology, there is much to look forward to in the future. New concepts, such as cyber warfare and quantum technology, added a new dimesion to all this. Worryingly, there were 2.5 million incidences of cyber crime reported in the UK during 2015, costing our economy some £27bn. This now ranks as a tier 1 threat along with terrorism, and often perpetrated by teenagers operating from their bedrooms. Do you know what your son or daughter is actually doing?! The implications for defence are quite alarming

## **Inspiring Children in Sport**

always, we like to make the most of every learning opportunity and the children were keen to write about their amazing experiences in their blog when they got back to school. Here is what they had to say.

"At the university we found out what happens and how university works. For example, how you spend your first year in the university then you have to find your own house! ## The Hackney and Bishop's Waltham deaneries link

## Two Lively Days in November

The Bishop's Waltham deanery reaches from Botley to Hambledon. There has been a link of friendship between our deanery and Hackney for nearly twenty five years, as part of which we try to support activities in Hackney that reach out to homeless and rough sleeping men and women and to ordinary families struggling to cope with the costs of modern life in London.

One Friday at the end of November, a small mountain of food, clothes and bedding collected from our parishes was brought to Swanmore Village Hall for delivery to our link friends and the Hackney Winter Night Shelter the next day. If you can imagine providing a hot meal for twenty to thirty quests, some of whom would really welcome a warm coat or a pair of trainers or a sleeping bag or shaving kit or a toothbrush, you can see how much it would help to have items sorted, labelled and packed ready for use. Twenty five helpers from eleven parishes, together with ten students from Swanmore College and their teacher, pitched into the task. Every table we could find in the hall was put to use. Heaps of tins, packets of pasta, boxes of tooth-paste, anoraks, pants, hats and gloves were taken to the right corner. At one point Mrs Payne, the Swanmore College teacher rushed back over the road to bag some more boxes from the IT department which were ideal for our purpose.

By the end of the morning the mountain had been reconstituted as two sizeable hills. One was for St Saviour's Priory, Dalston and the other for St James' Church, Clapton. Later that afternoon Noble Argue, who has provided the van for transport for the past nine years, arrived at the hall and a small gang of chaps, again from several parishes, loaded it ready for delivery.

The next day, Saturday, we set off at 7.00 am with Noble driving, accompanied by Keith Wickert, soon to be assistant priest at Bishop's Waltham, and Norman Chatfield for the delivery to Hackney. Battling the traffic on the approach to the Blackwall tunnel we arrived at the Priory by 9 45 am and found helpers ready to unload led by Sister Moira who for many years has been running the Dunloe Centre, which provides a cooked meal and take away food and clothes for local men and women in need, and Sister Elisabeth who runs a project called the Sunday Stall which is mostly for young local families. Later that afternoon, Sister Libby wrote:

"What a wonderful delivery of useful things from Bishop's Waltham Deanery. Please convey our thanks to all concerned – the donors, collectors, knitters, sorters, packers, and the driver and his crew. We have spent the day unpacking such good quality stuff and all the kind of things that are most needed. Food, toiletries, bedding, warm clothes – all exactly right; and some beautiful knitting. 'A BIG 'THANK YOU' TO EVERYONE. We pray and give thanks for you regularly through the year at our mid-day prayers in chapel. With our

very best wishes from us all at St Saviour's Priory and the Dunloe Centre."

Next we delivered to St James' Clapton which acts as a distribution centre for other churches and the winter night shelter. There Burnett Brown the churchwarden and husband of vicar prebendary Rosèmia Brown, the new area dean of Hackney and a longstanding supporter of the Link, told us that their Saturday evening drop-in centre, which provides a meal and companionship, had nearly run out of stored food so our delivery came just in time. The aim of this article is to assure everyone who supports the link in any way that their help is deeply appreciated. Also, we benefit very much from sharing in the committed spiritual life of the Hackney churches, which is the driving force behind all their life and work.

## Droxford Church Community Hub and Heritage project

### January update

hat a start to the year! On the 4<sup>th</sup> January we were informed that our application to the Heritage Lottery Fund (Grants for places of Worship) had been successful. A grant of up to £188,300 has been awarded, bringing the total contribution from HLF to the Hub Project to £222,200. Together with other contributions and our own funds we have now reached 50% of the estimated £600,000 capital cost of the hub project.

## What does the grant mean for Droxford Church?

The PCC can now plan to start work in April on the approved schedule of works for this phase of the project:

- To carry out the urgent restoration work to the church fabric and drainage system as detailed in the submitted application
- To install glazed screens in the North Chapel, with formal approval from Historic England for final proposals, to create a community room

 To develop a programme of activity to engage people with the heritage of the church, to include permanent displays and temporary exhibitions, a printed guide, curriculum-linked school resources, and walking and cycling trails.

Contractors have been appointed for the major works, which are expected to last 5 months. Fund-raising is continuing for the capital cost of an extension for a kitchen, toilets, storage and administration. As reported last month a grant application is in process with Hampshire County Council to the Community Buildings Capital Fund (CCBS grants) for a substantial proportion of the building costs.

#### **Report from Winchester City Council**

#### New Year plans at the city council

At the first full council meeting of the year, each of the portfolio holders introduces their plans for the year ahead. I thought it worthwhile to give you their names and responsibilities. Of course, they all have their individual ward duties as well. Their contact details are all on the WCC Web site, or queries can be relayed through your District Councillor. Here is the list:

Cllr Stephen Godfrey, leader; major projects are River Park, Silver Hill and Station Approach, as well as developing a treasury management strategy to support increased capital spending.

Cllr Mike Read, built environment; providing housing at major development areas as planned; facilitating affordable and extra care housing; ensuring design and high quality places.

Cllr Frank Pearson, environment; health and well-being; working with partners, waste collection, encouraging sports and healthy activities, monitoring air quality and climate change.

Cllr Steve Miller, estates portfolio; medium term financial planning and best use of assets, increasing Guildhall performance.

Cllr Caroline Horrill, housing; managing community needs in the light of the Housing and Welfare bill, enhancing council stock, addressing homelessness.

**Cllr James Byrnes**, economy & arts, tourism, parking; promoting community cohesion, traffic management and parking.

Cllr Vicki Weston – Deputy Leader, Organisational Development, Services – improving customer service excellence, reducing bureaucracy.

#### The impact of electoral boundary changes

This year's May elections will see the introduction of the new boundary changes for Winchester City Council, and the whole district will have an election. The area covered by *The Bridge* parishes will remain (as it is now) in two wards, but each of these wards will cover a larger area and will have more than one councillor. Exton, Meonstoke & Corhampton will be in Upper Meon Valley and will be represented by two councillors. Droxford will be in Central Meon Valley and will be represented by 3 Councillors. Cllrs Bodtger and Dibden are both stepping down in May, mainly for health reasons.

Promoting a positive way of living with dementia

In December, we held our Christmas lunch at the Old Forge Inn, Shedfield, followed by our last meeting of the year when we had a very jolly Christmas party, where the members were entertained by Bishops Bells, a local group of handbell ringers. The hand-bells added to the atmosphere of Christmas and tea was kindly provided by Sainsbury's, Hedge End, with mince pies, biscuits and cakes. We do thank them for their continued kindness and generosity to us.

And now, as we are already a month into 2016, our focus is on making sure that we reach out into the community to make carers aware of us. We are a group formed to help make life easier by showing that there can be a life whilst one is caring for a loved one living with Dementia. We witness the difference in the outlook of Carers as they become established members of the Meon Valley Carers Group. Not only do they loose the feeling of being isolated and unhappy but gradually establish lasting friendships.

The pub lunch at The Forge, Shedfield, on the second Tuesday each month, provides all carers with an opportunity to relax and socialise with others just like them. The group meeting is held at The Paterson Centre, Church Road, Swanmore on the fourth Tuesday each month. On a regular basis, carers are able to mix with people who are in a similar situation, while their cared-for are able to be with them and are encouraged by volunteers to take part in stimulating activities, such as art, games, and musical events. We endeavour to compile a programme that will provide interesting speakers and also include two to three outings a year. The generosity of the Meon Valley Lions Club means that members who are without transport are collected by minibus and bought to the meetings and taken safely home afterwards.

Our volunteer helpers attend the meetings and pub lunch and always provide a warm welcome to any new comers. Please do come and see for yourself how this extremely friendly, relaxed group of people will lighten your worries and help you in any way they can

## **Every child matters**

year ago the Valley Preschool took the decision to broaden its accessibility and welcome two year olds through its doors, lowering the minimum age from two years and five months. In the second part of our series exploring areas of staff specialism, we talk to the preschool's two year-olds coordinator, Charlotte Chappell.

Charlotte has worked at the preschool for two years, has five years' experience in childcare and has completed the NVQ Level 3. She lives in Droxford with her partner and two children, has grown up in the Meon Valley and knows the community well. She enjoys mountain biking, cooking, travelling, uninterrupted sleep (rare!) and going on walks with her dogs, preferably with a country pub en route! Charlotte tells me that she enjoys working at the preschool as she feels part of a really dedicated and caring team of staff, and "that each day brings a completely different challenge". Those who know Charlotte describe her as a very positive person and this comes across in her energy for involving the children in creative activities such as cooking, singing, and dancing.

Charlotte is currently taking part in the Government's DITTO initiative – *Drilling into Terrific Twos Outcomes*, created in response to the government agenda for supporting early education needs of vulnerable two year olds. Charlotte tells me, "The DITTO programme is about childcare settings working in partnership across a local area to ensure that the two year olds within our care are well supported." Since the admission of two year olds, the staff have adapted the curriculum and environment to ensure that the youngest children are learning, progressing, and being nurtured in the same way as the older children: Charlotte's role is at the centre of this child-focused approach.

As part of the DITTO programme Charlotte tells me that she observes and collects Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) learning and development data on the two year old children, which is then anonymised and shared with childcare partners. Through the sharing of data and examples of best practice, staff work towards

the gold standard of helping vulnerable two year olds to acquire communication and language skills, and on supporting their physical, personal, social, and emotional development; the aim being that all children make rapid progress in their learning.

The two year olds have enjoyed returning to preschool this term into the colourful world of *Elmer the Patchwork Elephant*, from the popular series of children's books created by David McKee. They explore a variety of Elmer-themed activities – baking cakes with Elmer-coloured decorations, recycling plastic milk bottles to build elephants, and using Numicon to explore numbers and patterns within the Elmer shape. The teachers have also been focusing on the uniqueness of Elmer and asking the children to talk about what makes them different and special.

Charlotte says, "It's so noticeable with our two year old children how much progress they make with social skills after starting preschool. Interacting with other children of the same age and aspiring to learn the skills of the older children, are both hugely beneficial. Language development can progress really quickly, with young children moving from an environment where they only have to make themselves understood to people who know them well, to having conversations with new people – they immediately try harder!"

Thank you to Charlotte for sharing this special area of interest with us.

#### **Fundraising thanks**
