ON REFLECTION



A friend of mine told me recently that whilst he had been born on Palm Sunday, none of his subsequent birthdays over the next 60 odd years had fallen on Palm Sunday.

We all know that Jesus' birth is celebrated on 25th December every year, but Good Friday, the day we mourn his crucifixion, and Easter Sunday, the day we celebrate his resurrection from the dead, are moveable. Why is this?

The Royal Museums Greenwich website tells us that Easter falls on a Sunday between 22nd March and 25th April, but working out which Sunday exactly requires an astronomical calculation.

The simple standard definition of Easter is that it is the first Sunday after the full Moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox.

If the full Moon falls on a Sunday then Easter is the next Sunday. The website then provides an algorithm with 14 lines of instructions to enable

Why is the Easter date such a moveable Feast?

us to work it out precisely – no surprise here, given that Royal Museums Greenwich includes the Royal Observatory.

This year Palm Sunday falls on 2nd April (with a 10.30am Holy Communion Service at Meonstoke).

Good Friday falls on 7th April (with a 10.30am service at Exton) and Easter Sunday on 9th April (with 8.00am Holy Communion at Exton, 10.30am Holy Communion and Family Services respectively at Droxford and Meonstoke).

Under the heading The Greatest Commandment, Mark's Gospel tells us how the authorities sought to catch Jesus out in the run up to the crucifixion:

28. One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?"

29. "The most important one," Jesus answered, "is this: Hear, O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.

30. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength."

31. "The second is this: Love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these."

Not all of us are Christians. But hopefully all can agree that 'Love your neighbour as yourself' is a good principle to follow for those of all faiths and none, and if we did that the world would be a better place.

Historic monument is restored and re-dedicated

A century-old terracotta monument to pottery designer and former Meonstoke resident Dorothy Marshall Lawrence in St Andrew's churchyard has been brought back to its former glory following painstaking restoration, and re-dedicated.

At a special service at the church the Rev'd Canon Anthony Hulbert kindly stood in, at very short notice, for the Rt Rev'd Dr Jonathan Frost, Bishop of Portsmouth, who was unfortunately not well enough to take the service.

The monument, which features four angels, is a large and complex work by the Arts and Crafts pottery designer Mary Seton Watts, and had suffered severe damage over the years.

Conservation work was carried out by Patricia Jackson, Mick Pinner of West Meon Pottery, and South Coast Memorials, with the support of a number of local volunteers and funding from the family, the Pilgrim Trust/Church Care and other local donors.

Members of the family, who had travelled from Kent and Suffolk, gathered with the conservator and the congregation



to take part in the service and hear a talk by Hilary Calvert, a national expert, about the life and work of the artist, who founded the Compton Potters' Guild in 1898 with products sold at fashionable retailers such as Liberty.

The talk was followed by a lunch provided by local parishioners. The church was decorated with angels made by the school children of Meonstoke CofE Infant School, and displays of historic photographs of the village and of the Lawrence family.





Firefighter Helen: 'An inspiration to women to join the fire service'

Tributes have been paid to Helen Davis, one of Hampshire's first female firefighters and who served at Droxford Fire Station for 21 years.

She was also the first female in Hampshire to drive an appliance on blue lights, and is fondly remembered by the crew as a trailblazer and inspiration to women to join the fire service.

When she joined 30 years ago there were very few women in the fire service. Today the station's current crew includes three female firefighters, one of whom has followed in Helen's footsteps and also become an appliance driver.

Helen lived at Big Tree Cottages, Soberton, and died in January aged 62 after a long battle with cancer.

One of the firefighters she trained at

Droxford was one-time Meonstoke resident Beth Medway-Aspinall, who is now a crew manager at Southsea fire station.

She said at the funeral, "I had the absolute pleasure of meeting Helen when I joined Droxford Fire Station in 2006, where she became not only my mentor, but my great friend too.

"Being one of the county's first female firefighters she had expectations for those she had paved the way for. She had set an example and a standard, and, needless to say, I wanted to be like her.

"She was respected not only for her strength and knowledge, but also for her ability to help others and explain things in a clear and concise manner. She always had a smile for everyone and infused a sense of fun into even

the most mundane of tasks.

"The advice and lessons she taught me are the foundation of my role today. I will be forever grateful for her legacy of compassion, kindness and generosity.

"She was determined, competent and a joy to be around. Her laughter was infectious and it makes me smile just to think of all the adventures we had the privilege of attending together in order to protect our community and surrounding county.

"So thank you Helen for all the hours you dedicated to helping your community, and for the support, encouragement and education you gave me and our colleagues.

"Your strength and determination, particularly in the last few years, was unquestionable."



Phoenix House to become a luxury hotel

The company that has bought the former drug rehabilitation centre Phoenix House in Midlington Road, Droxford, has revealed more about their plans to turn it into a luxury 5-star hotel, and to make its leisure facilities available to local residents.

Grand Hotel Excelsior International Ltd purchased the property three years ago. They told a meeting of the Droxford History Group they plan to build an extension matching the existing frontage in design, to provide a total of 64 bedrooms, together with amenities for banquets, weddings and trade shows.

Guests' leisure facilities, such as an indoor pool, spa and gymnasium, would also be made available for local residents to use.

Work has carried on steadily over the past three years to upgrade the interior whilst retaining as many of its historic features as possible, such as the ornate ceilings, heavy wood panelling and window shutters.

"It's going to be beautiful," the group's Administrative Manager, Helen Hubbard told the meeting.

"We're going to retain all the existing architecture, because as a company we appreciate history. If we acquire an old building we don't knock it down. We like to keep it as many of its original features as we can. Importantly, we wish to revert to its original name of Fairfield House."

But exactly when the hotel will open is uncertain. Although a planning application was submitted 18 months ago, further architectural drawings

were now required, and she could not at the moment give a date.

The house, with its seven acres of garden, was built in 1909 by Henry Hamilton Bridge, who lived there until 1931. He died in 1935, aged 90.

After further private ownership it was bought by the Government in 1951 as a mental health hospital. In 2005 it became a centre for long-term drug abusers called Alpha House, later renamed Phoenix House.

Until it closed in 2016 residents came from all over the UK. Across a 13-hour day, and under military style rules, they studied for exams,

attended group sessions, and performed chores around the house and garden so they could return into the community better equipped to cope with life.

The regime was certainly tough. The Rev'd Anthony Hulbert told the meeting he had known its founder, Dr Christie.

"He was a man who believed you shouldn't molly-coddle addicts. If anyone stepped out of line they would be punished by the removal of privileges, made to scrub floors and sometimes have to wear a notice around their neck detailing their misdemeanors."

The hotel group is anxious to learn of any living descendants of Henry Hamilton Bridge to invite them to the hotel's opening when the time comes. If you are one, or know of any, please contact Helen Hubbard at admin@aphw.net


4. Pauline Quarendon

Aged 93, Pauline Quarendon is one of Meonstoke's longest-standing residents, having arrived here in 1967.

Many will know her as a retired lay reader in the church for many years, and a valued contributor to village life, but may not be aware that she once held an important role in charge of the laundry and catering services at all Hampshire County Council's residential centres.

She and her Naval Captain husband Trevor (pictured right) were married for 65 years, until he sadly died five years ago.

These are some of her favourite pieces of music, along with the memories they evoke.



We'll Gather Lilacs

I was born in 1930, and lived in Stockton-on-Tees until war broke out when, as a nine-year-old, and with my father out patrolling as an ARP, I would often spend nights in a dugout, feeling very scared.

In 1940 I was evacuated to a boarding school in Kendal away from everyone I knew, where I stayed for seven years, seeing my parents during the school holidays. I can remember feeling lonely and totally lost at first, though I have to say the teachers were wonderful.

We'll Gather Lilacs was a famous wartime song promising that everything would come right in the end. 'We'll gather lilacs in the spring again, and walk together down an English lane, until our hearts have learned to sing again, when you come home once more.'

Elgar's Chanson de Matin

At 17 my father suggested I take up a career in catering because he said I'd be good at it. So I went to a domestic science college in Edinburgh for two years, then got a job in Teeside working with the school meals service, only to have to give it up four years later when I married Trevor, the reason being that it was not the done thing then for Navy wives to have jobs!

Trevor and I had known each other all our lives, having lived just two doors from each other as children. We lost contact during the war but one day while I was still in Edinburgh the battleship HMS Anson in which he was serving sailed into the Firth of Forth, and we met up again and gradually fell in love.

I was 21 and he was 23 and we wanted to marry, but because he was under 25 he had to get his Captain's permission and, as was the custom in those days, my father's approval as well. Happily both said yes, and *Chanson de Matin*

was the song we chose to have at our wedding.

Eternal Father Strong to Save

Being a Navy wife wasn't easy. It was a shock to be suddenly transported from my life in the north to HMS Collingwood and a bungalow in Lee on Solent where I knew absolutely no one.

On the very first day my landlady came round and gave me strict instructions on how she wanted the dustbin lined. It had to have three lots of newspaper around the inside and a big wodge at the bottom. She told me severely, "This is how I want it done every week, and I shall expect it to be done like that!"

Trevor stayed in the Navy for 32 years. 'Eternal Father Strong to Save' – which is sometimes referred to as 'For those in Peril on the Sea' – has been adopted as the Navy hymn, and I heard it many

times at naval functions and church services.

Ladies in Lavender

By 1962 attitudes towards women were slowly changing, but it was still rare for Navy Officers' wives to work. Trevor rather bravely defied the trend by one day by saying to me, 'Why don't you use all your gifts and skills to get a job again?'

That was the best present he ever gave me because when we came to Meonstoke in 1967 I went into social services again and eventually took charge of the catering, laundry and domestic services in all HCC's residential centres, including their childrens' homes and day centres.

I worked full-time for 16 years until I retired at age 60. You weren't allowed to work on past retirement age in those days, which was a pity because I really enjoyed it. I also taught domestic science at Highbury Tech, and *Ladies in Lavender* was the title song of the film I saw at Havant Library during that time.

The Intermezzo from Cavaliera Rusticana

While I was living in Portsmouth my mother came to visit and we took her to see *Cavaliera Rusticana* at The Kings Theatre. Tragically she died in the autumn of that year, aged just 58.

On moving to Meonstoke I became involved with village life: the Mothers' Union, running the Sunday School, and being in the Riverside Players along with people like Paul and Gerry Hayles, Liz Wade, Ian Marlow and Lynn Judge. I vividly remember the old Meon Hut, where the early performances took place, burning down in 1982. That was an awful morning. I watched it from my window opposite, and I was heartbroken.

It was while I was running the Sunday School that the curate suggested I should become a lay minister. The Rev'd Canon David Henley agreed and arranged for me to undergo three years' training at Portsmouth Cathedral, where I was licensed by Bishop Kenneth Stephenson in 1996.

So began my Reader Ministry, my remits being preaching, taking confirmation classes, conducting funerals and following them up with pastoral care. It was virtually a full-time job from 1996 until 2010, when I eased off to look after Trevor who had begun to develop Parkinsons.

I don't go to the main Sunday services now because I find them a bit too much for me physically. But the Rev'd Canon Anthony Hulbert takes me to the midweek communion at Droxford every Thursday. It's only half an hour long and afterwards we all meet for a coffee and a good old chinwag.

I continue to keep a prayer group going at my home every four to six weeks, with around ten people attending, and I do pastoral care as well when I'm asked. I find it rather overpowering when people still ring me and say, "I need to have a chat with someone, can we talk?"

Saint-Saens' Carnival of the Animals

This is for my two great-grandchildren,



Matilda and Georgia, twins now aged six. We all love it because it cheers us up. I sometimes play it in the kitchen to myself and I bounce about to it, hoping no one's passing by or they'll think I've really gone mad.

Matilda asked me the other day how long ago her great-grandpa had died. Her mummy Katherine told her it was about five years.

Matilda looked at me and said, 'That's a long time. Why have you never got married again?' I replied, 'Because I'm a very wobbly old woman now and no man would want to take me on at this stage in my life.' And she said, 'Well I think that's a shame!'

My daughter Janet said to me the other day, 'Look at the things going on in the world today, with Putin and the dreadful earthquakes. Compared to that, what have we got to grumble about?' My younger daughter Anna and I both said together, 'You're right!'

So I enjoy life still. Who wouldn't in the Bridge Parishes, with such wonderful neighbours and friends? God bless you, every one.

How would I cope on the Island?

Terrible. I'm a person who likes people around me. Maybe I could try to learn monkey language and communicate with them instead.

The book I would take: Captain Corelli's Mandolin, because it's set in Greece during the Italian and German occupation. Trevor was one of the Navy's Italian interpreters, so we often travelled through Italy.

My luxury item: A digital radio with an endless supply of batteries, because listening to Classic FM would keep me cheerful.

The one record I would save from the waves: Cavaliera Rusticana, as it brings back wonderful memories of my mother.

Residents demand an end to 'Splash Route vandalism'

For some years now drivers of 4x4 vehicles have been using the 200metre stretch of river by the Mill at Droxford to splash through at speed, several times a week, as a leisure activity.

Motorcyclists, too, enjoy what they call their "sport" — riding through (pictured) what has become known locally as the Splash Route

But, say local people, it's a sport which is causing immense damage to the river, its habitat and wildlife, not to mention a considerable noise nuisance to people living nearby who are now demanding an end to it.

They say the bow waves of the vehicles have left the banks of the river – which is one of just 200 such chalk streams in the world, and of which almost a half are in Britain – eroded and undercut.

This in turn has had a drastic effect on the river's wildlife. While the endangered water vole has successfully been reintroduced to the river, local conservationists have been dismayed to find it has entirely disappeared at this point.

The disturbance of such traffic up and down this stretch has also rendered it unsuitable for the use by marginnesting waterbirds, they say.

Local conservationist Anthony McEwen, describes this part of the river as "an underwater desert."

Many species of invertebrates, such as the Freshwater Shrimp, which is the trout's staple diet, and which are measured in hundreds elsewhere in the river, are now so scarce at this part there is now little or no evidence of their presence at all.

He told *The Bridge*: "The banks and the river itself should offer a haven for an abundance of wildlife ranging from water voles and otters through to bullheads, lampreys and a mass of fly life.

"But not only has the water vole gone,

but the disturbance is destroying potential spawning grounds for trout, and driving away nesting birds such as coots and moorhens. It is sheer vandalism."

But why is it happening in the first place?

Says Mr McEwen, "Curiously, the practice is not illegal. In the days when there was a working mill there was a ford across the river which allowed carts and horses to cross to what is now the footpath alongside.

"The carts, we believe, then re-entered the river to access the mill. Over time the river became designated as an official road and was even given a number – U189 – which still appears, it is believed erroneously, on some historic maps.

"This designation has never been rescinded, and the 4x4 drivers and the motorcyclists have used this knowledge to pursue their activities."

Adam Faulkner, who owns The Mill, says the vehicles race up and down the river four or five times a week, usually



at weekends and often late at night.

He says, "It shouldn't be that difficult for a traffic order to be imposed to stop it happening, but it's taking some time to convince the relative authorities.

"We have formed a group of around 100 local residents and enthusiasts, and have the support of all three local parish councils, who feel very strongly about this.

"It simply doesn't make sense to have 4x4s going through it and causing this kind of damage to such a rare, sensitive and precious habitat."

In November the group wrote to Hampshire County Council asking for the route be de-classified.

The Council replied that the driving of vehicles along the route was currently "a lawful activity with the status of the route clearly established in law."

They added that they would not, other than in exceptional circumstances, "take action to restrict what were long standing legal highway rights, and



especially as this could be a lengthy and legally-contested process."

However the Council agreed that in this case the environmental impacts did require further investigation.

Now *The Bridge* can report that on 2nd March a site visit was arranged, attended by Mr Faulkner, Mr McEwen, HCC Councillor Hugh Lumby and Cllr Nick Adams-King, who is the lead member for the HCC's Universal Services Department.

After the meeting Mr Adams-King wrote to Cllr Lumby: "I was pleased to be shown the site. I now better understand the challenge, and I think the group too understands the challenge the County Council faces in implementing a traffic order to close the ford.

"The HCC is continuing to investigate the matter and to gather evidence, including the commissioning of ecological and environmental reports that will help understand potential impact.


"Inevitably that takes a little time, but I hope that will aid our route to finding a solution."

Cllr Lumby told *The Bridge*, "I am confident that the County Council now understands the importance of dealing with the problem, and is committed to taking action.

"I know they are considering various solutions. However, I think it will be a few months yet before we see an outcome."

Pauline's donation has been given to help with the cost of smartening up the patio area of the hall by renewing the patio fence, and fitting a new Small Hall patio sliding door - both in need of replacement.

We are hoping that these works will be the start of marking the

Meon Hall's Coronation Project for some much-needed improvements and projects.

These will include the start of the planning and funding of the installation of a large array of Solar Panels on the Main Hall's roof, to generate electricity and help reduce the hall's costs.

Time for the fertiliser!

Spring flowering bulbs bring a welcome splash of colour to our gardens as they emerge from the gloom of winter. In order to sustain this display for future years it is important to feed the plants with high potassium liquid feed such as tomato fertiliser.

This is best done at fortnightly intervals after the bulbs have finished flowering and before the leaves start to turn yellow.

Vegetables – Sow main crop carrots and peas. In May, sow beetroot and continue to sow salad crops and perhaps a second sowing of broad beans. Protect potato foliage from late frosts by earthing up, or at the end of May cover with fleece for a few weeks to reduce the risk of blight.

Fruit – Remove all dead and diseased leaves from strawberry plants, cutting as close as possible to the crown without damaging it.

Feed with general-purpose fertiliser and put down a good layer of mulch. Put a cloche or polytunnel over early fruiting varieties to ensure earliest possible fruits.

Herbaceous border – Divide and replant perennials such as Michaelmas daisies, helianthus and monarda.

Feed and mulch roses. Plant out sweet pea seedlings and sow annual seeds directly into the border. Prune hydrangea paniculata and Buddleia very hard to promote strong new growth this year, remember these shrubs flower on the current year's growth, so they respond well to this treatment every year.

Cut back old or diseased wood on Forsythia to stimulate new growth, remember flowers will grow next year on wood that ripens this year. Hard prune wall-trained or hedging Pyracantha. In late May, lightly trim back winter flowering heathers.

Lawns - Now is the time to lay or sow new lawns. Existing lawns should be scarified to remove moss and thatch, and then fed with a proprietary lawn feed.

If weeds are a problem in your lawn use a combined lawn weed and feed mixture. If moss is particularly bad it is better to apply moss killer to kill the



moss before scarifying.

In the greenhouse – Cut back overwintered fuchsias by about two thirds when the first buds begin to show and begin to feed and water them.

From mid-April bedding plants and tender vegetables like tomatoes and courgettes can be put outside on mild days to harden them off, but only do so on still days, as wind can damage tender young plants by desiccating the leaves.

Take cuttings of dahlias started in compost earlier in the year. Look out for aphids, particularly on overwintered fuchsias with tender new growth, and eliminate with appropriate pesticide or soapy water.

WE'LL RING FOR THE KING!

Last August my 10-year-old brother Maxim and I started learning what might be the most unexpected but rewarding skill we've ever learnt, after my friend Annabel asked me to start to learn with her.

I thought it would be good 'skill' challenge for my Duke of Edinburgh bronze award, so I gave it a go. A week's crash course later, and Annabel and I had passed our Level One (which our Mum is still trying to do, a few aeons on)!

Soon after we started learning, the Queen died and our local teacher Jeremy, who is the Head Ringer for Westminster Abbey, was called to ring for the state funeral.

Then came the national recruitment campaign! 'Ring for The King' was started by the Central Council of Bell Ringers to train up enough recruits to mark the King's Coronation in May by ringing the bells in as many bell towers as possible across the land. This is because another 8,000 ringers were needed!

By joining Claire Francis's new band of Droxford Bellringers we have now reduced that number, and this Spring we will welcome three more beginners from Droxford.

There isn't an minimum or maximum age but you need to be strong enough to pull on the ropes. I think young people find it easier to learn because they have good core strength and a better memory! Any of you want to give it a go?

What do we particularly like about bell ringing?

Apart from being in control of a tonne of metal hanging above your head, It's about mastering the technique which is NOT easy.

It isn't as simple as just pulling on a rope, which is what we all thought when we started learning. You can do that, but that's just called chiming.

As soon as the first bell rings, everyone else follows on one after another and this is called 'ringing in rounds'.

More complex are the 'call changes.'
This is when the lead ringer calls out for certain bells to swap, and so make a melodious tune or peal. It is hard on the arms - ringing is a free gym workout - but it is worth it when you do it right!

Also, the sense of history is pretty amazing. Villagers who lived before us have heard the very same sound from the same bells over the past 400 years.

Droxford's oldest bell dates from 1606 in the reign of King James - the year after the Gunpowder Plot!

The next two oldest bells of 1679 saw the previous King Charles, the Merry Monarch, on the throne. Our country had just experienced the plague pandemic and The Great Fire of London!

The fourth oldest bell is Victorian and dates from 1899 - the year the Boer War began - and it will have been tolled mournfully when Queen Victoria died in 1901.

During the first and second world wars the bells stayed silent. The newest bell was cast and rung in 1969 - the year of the first moon landing!

The bells were rung right up to 1999 and then stayed silent on Sundays as the village didn't have its own band of ringers, and a band had to be brought in from surrounding villages to ring for special occasions.

All this has now changed, the bells have regained their voices, and our new band looks forward to ringing for you - for services, weddings and special occasions.

This May we will peal out for the King's Coronation and at the Droxford Summer Fair in June.

But we have a lot of fundraising to do. We started out this January with £0 in the bell tower pot. Yet to keep the bells ringing we need to buy new ropes (one rope recently broke when my brother Max was ringing and it nearly landed on his head!).

We do hope you will all support us in our fundraising to keep our historic bells alive and ringing.

Children discover Droxford's place in the geographical landscape

Droxford's Year 3/4 children have been out and about in the Meon Valley learning the similarities and differences between rural and urban settings, specifically in their own village, and the city of Southampton.

They used atlases, maps, globes and Google Earth to identify where Droxford is in the world. Then they undertook a field trip around the village following an O/S map route and an i-spy trail, practising mapping skills.

They also participated in two traffic surveys – one by the fire station and another by the A32.

Back in school the children drew geographical sketch maps of their walk and labelled them using symbols and a key. They also collated the traffic survey data into graphs and charts.

Finally, they learnt about the differences between Human and Physical geography. They explored the term 'Land Use' – relating it to agriculture: residential, recreational, forestry and industrial spaces.

It's all part of their Geography curriculum, and is important

because it enables them to make significant observations about their lives, and in broader terms experience life in wider contexts in Hampshire.

They are now in the process of comparing the village, the River Meon and local geography to Southampton.

They will travel to Mayflower Park, where they will observe, first hand, the use of Southampton water (which the rivers Itchen and Test empty into) with its container port, cruise liner berths and Red Funnel Ferry terminal.

They will then conduct a much busier traffic survey to help make comparisons.

From this site they will cross the

road and walk along the old walls before descending down side streets which have fascinating old buildings which help tell the story of Southampton in a historical context.

In the morning the children will have already visited the Southampton City Art Gallery.

Here they will see images related to the history of the city, plus paintings from other industrial landscapes – some by the world famous painter, LS Lowry, who the children studied in Art recently.

They will also participate in two tasks: make self-portrait sculptures using wire followed by a facilitated gallery tour.



HAMPSHIRE AND WINCHESTER COUNCILLOR'S REPORT Hugh Lumby



MEON VALLEY DIVISION, CENTRAL AND UPPER MEON VALLEY WARDS



Time to step down from the City Council

This will be my last report as the local Winchester City Councillor, as the four and a half years since I was last elected for the Upper Meon Valley ward are up; they have shot by alarmingly quickly!

Since being elected to Hampshire County Council in 2021 I have been representing a total of 18 parishes.

The resulting workload has meant that I have not been able to give every issue the attention I wanted and so I have reluctantly decided to focus on HCC work and give someone else a go at Winchester.

I have really enjoyed being a WCC

...but I'll carry on representing you on the HCC

councillor so it was not an easy decision.

The four years is also up for Vicki Weston, one of the councillors for the Central Meon Valley. Vicki has also decided to stand down as a district councillor in May.

Vicki has been a Winchester City Councillor for 16 years, first representing Swanmore and Newtown and later Hambledon, Droxford and Waltham Chase as well.

She served on the WCC cabinet and was deputy leader for three different leaders. I am sure everyone joins me in thanking her for all her dedication and insights over the years.

So we will have two new district councillors after the May elections. I will still be here as your Hampshire County Councillor and I'm looking forward to working with them as a new chapter is written.

Fly-tipping and noisy motorbikes: some of issues that still need to be worked on

My main impression after my years on the City Council is how little it impacts on us in the National Park.

District councils in Hampshire are small anyway with activities generally focused around urban areas and planning. So the day-today impact on us is generally limited to the weekly bin collection.

WCC also have responsibility for flytipping on verges (but oddly not on roads).

Some progress has been made on fly tipping, especially with the use of cameras, but the condition of verges shows that more needs to be done.

My overriding objective as a city



councillor has been protecting the beautiful countryside in which we live, and the planning regime is critical to this.

The National Park is the planning authority and this does provide a level of protection. However, much of the day to day planning function is carried out by WCC.

Unfortunately, the emasculation of its planning and enforcement services has led to increasing delays in dealing with many applications and seemingly haphazard decisions.

WCC has a laudable council house building programme, with ambitious targets. We need to ensure that this has a rural element, to protect our communities.

The biggest issues locally have been the noisy motorbikes on the A32 and the A272 and the quality of local broadband and mobile phone signals.

WCC was quick to explain that these were outside its remit and it had no power to assist. However, as the imminent arrival of the average speed cameras attest, with determination it *is* possible to make progress!

The Council does have some great officers and it still does some really good things. However, years of underfunding mean that the current model of multi-layered local government is increasingly under strain.
