# **ON REFLECTION**

In 1993 Les Issac, a Church leader in London, asked himself three questions:

If I believe that the good news of Jesus is practical as well as spiritual, what does that mean for the mission of the Church?

How relevant is the Church to our twenty-first century society?

How effective are Christians at engaging across cultures and with their local community?

This line of thought led him to form the Street Pastor movement which, since 1993, has spread to many cities and larger towns across the country,

Portsmouth Street Pastors, for instance, was one of the earlier ones to be started in 2007, with volunteers drawn from a wide variety of Christian churches. Street Pastors patrol the Guildhall area — and sometimes Albert Road and Palmerston Road on Friday and Saturday nights

between 10-30pm and 3am.

Their purpose is to provide support to those out and about and visiting the clubs and bars at that time of night.

Typically this includes simple conversations (faith or otherwise), helping those who have become separated from their friends, charging flat telephone batteries, helping those who have had too much to drink or have had their drinks spiked,

engaging with the homeless, and on occasions helping lone women get home safely.

The Street Pastors' motto is to offer reassurance, safety and support through listening, caring and helping.

Finally, a prayer by Frank Weston, Bishop of Zanzibar in the 1920s. I rather like it as it is short but thoughtprovoking.

Now go out into the highways and hedges where not even the Bishops will try to hinder you. Go out and look for Jesus in the ragged, in the naked, in the oppressed and sweated, in those who have lost hope, in those who are struggling to make good. Look for Jesus. And when you see him, gird yourselves with his towel and try to wash their feet.

In Barn Owls Class, (Years R and 1) the children have been extremely busy exploring their classroom and engaging in a variety of activities.

In the role play area, Miss Hatton has set up a Doctor's Surgery and the children have been doctors and nurses, using role play tools and equipment to assess their 'patients.'

Through this role play, the children also shared their understanding of the importance of hand washing. The class have also been creating family portraits using paint and other materials.

In Snowy Owls (Year 2) the class has been learning about place value, using multilink, numicon and other objects to show tens, ones and how we make a whole number, and using the equipment to look at different ways of making 20.

In Literacy the class has started reading the book *On Sudden Hill* by Linda Sarah and Benji Davies.

Inspired by the book, the children had amazing fun using giant cardboard boxes to make their own creations. There were some fantastic ideas including puppet shows, reclining



chairs and even surf boards!

In Collective Worship, children across the school have been thinking about the value of Courage and how important this is. # Congratulations to Carys and Charlotte, our Roller Derby heroes

Carys Wigglesworth from Droxford and her friend Charlotte Wright from Swanmore were able to represent Great Britain in the junior Roller Derby World Cup in August, thanks to a £200 donation each towards their travel costs from Wilfrid's Café, and a further £200 each from Swanmore Lyons Club.

The 18-year-olds were selected from around 100 teenagers across the UK to travel to Valence in France to compete against six other world-wide teams, where they came fifth overall.

Wilfrid's chair, Margaret Wallace, said, "The sport doesn't receive any central funding through government or sports bodies, so their journey had to be completely self-funded.

"That's why we were delighted to help towards their costs, and they did brilliantly. They are two young people with a huge amount of determination,

In collaboration with Sarah Smith, who is a member of the Senior Operations Team at Wilfrid's Cafe, it was decided that a market dedicated to local makers, including all things handmade and hand finished locally, would be good way to raise money for the Village Hall.

An additional aim was to increase the footfall and spend at the Cafe by sending customers up to them with vouchers, and

allowing them to buy hot drinks at a reduced price - perfect on a rainy day.

Likewise, those who had visited the Cafe, perhaps after a stroll along the railway line, were signposted to the Village Hall to check out the array of crafts and produce available.

Despite the drizzly rain, it was felt that the day was a success both by the stall holders and by happy customers (myself included, having bought a beautiful silver necklace from Gail Jones, a stunning print from Deborah Hemsworth, and a framed photo from Chris Horner... just don't tell my husband!)

There was a brilliant selection of goods to buy including handmade cards; sewing crafts; silver jewellery; delicious cakes and bakes; jams and preserves; stunning local





photography; dried flowers and scented candles and wax melts.

It really did demonstrate how industrious Droxford and the surrounding area is behind closed doors!

As always, a big thank you to the amazing people of Droxford for supporting the market and our talented residents.

As well as providing a community event, the market was a great platform for the makers to show us what they can do - and for us to buy gifts and produce of great quality right on our doorstep.

It is truly a privilege to live in our fantastic community, where we support each other like this.

By the time you are reading this, we will have already held our biannual book sale - reaching a whopping £1,000 in funds raised for the Village Hall since December last year - and the Toy Swap event, for which we received funding from the HCC Waste Prevention Team.

# **Garden Club Annual Show proved popular once again**

The Meon Hall was fragrant and awash with vibrant displays of flowers, together with vegetables, fruit, home bakes, jams and crafts, when the Meon Valley Garden Club held its 148th Summer Show.

Our records suggest that the show is even older than this but evolved into the 'Flower Show' in 1875 from its original name as the annual 'Potato Show.'

This year we had 62 entrants, a slight increase over 2022, and 473 entries, 80 more than the previous year. This indicates that people were each putting in more exhibits.

The only area which declined in popularity was the Childrens' section.

This was disappointing as we had targeted children via social media and WhatsApp messages to schools, as well as local WhatsApp groups.

Although there were so few children's entries they were delightful and we saw fantastic artwork and models. It would be great to have more children's entries next year.

The weather leading up to the show was wet and windy. This caused havoc with the gazebos which almost

all blew away and had to be dispensed with despite the best efforts of Phil Butler and his excellent team of outdoor helpers.

Many of the classes proved popular, in particular the Meon Valley Nursery Trophy which this year was a dark leaved Tuberous Begonia named Bossa Nova with 17 entries.

In the Vegetable section, courgettes, French beans and cucumbers were the most numerous exhibits but there were no peas, chard or large onions submitted.

Overall, there were 83 vegetable entries and this year was much better than the last in terms of fruit. Over double the number of entries were

shown: 32 against just 15 in 2022.

There were 153 Flower entries, well up on the previous three years. The most popular classes were the Flowering Shrubs, Vase of Mixed Summer Flowers and Single Blooms. Again, there were not as many roses on show, perhaps due to the hot weather in June, though there were still some beautiful examples.

Cookery was again popular with 80 entries across the section, and particularly for both of the classes where recipes were supplied. The judge had a tough job choosing between 16 Malt Loaves and 17 Brownies. Sadly, there were only two contenders for the Men's Cookery class which this year was Watercress Soup.

The many and varied talents of Club members were also displayed in the Handicraft Section and particularly the Photography Section which was very popular this year with some stunning photos of birds and single blooms.

The Meon Valley Garden Club would like to thank everyone involved in putting on the show, as well as all those who participated in entering the various categories of the show.

# Desert Island Discs 7. John Martin

John Martin has been playing the organ in our four churches for 47 years, and even at the age of 90 he sees no reason to stop.

He moved to Droxford in 1960 where, after 20 years, he was surprised to find he was suddenly living in Soberton. "When I came here, Station Road was in Droxford," he says. "I was very annoyed to wake up one morning to find they had moved the boundary, and I was now 100 yards into Soberton. I never asked to be in Soberton. I was quite happy living in Droxford!

Here he talks about his life, and chooses six of his favourite records:

I was born in Southampton and I have very clear recollections as a small child of the war. During the blitz I would be dragged out of bed to go into the air raid shelter at the bottom of our garden.

Southampton would be ablaze, with planes roaming overhead, bombs whizzing down and exploding, and anti-aircraft guns blasting away night after night. Later I was evacuated to Bournemouth for a year, and lived with some very nice foster parents.

When it came time to choose a career I applied to work in the Public Health Laboratory at Winchester Hospital.

On the way to the interview I knocked on the wrong door, which was opened by the prettiest girl I had ever seen. I was bowled over. I found out who she was, and wrote to her asking her out. After a long courtship we married. Hazel and I have been together now for 67 years.

### **1**. Beethoven's Piano Concerto No 5, The Emperor.

Choosing six records was a total nightmare, but I decided I must have Beethoven, and it had to be a big piano concerto. This was possibly the first piece of classical music I really appreciated. An uncle had a record of it and he played it, and I thought this really is a bit special. The start, for instance, with that great shower of notes coming down, and then the sublime slow movement.

One of my hobbies at the time was magic and I did shows for children. There was a GP in Southampton called Dr Sunak, and I did three consecutive annual shows for his son Rishi, who I must say was a very well-behaved little boy, and has done quite well for himself since.

I also put on shows for adults in which I

pretended to have supernatural mental powers. For example I would ask someone in the audience to open a book at any page, and I'd tell them what word they were looking at.

What was interesting was how some people didn't realise it was a trick, and actually thought it was genuine. One lady said to me, "I didn't know you were a clairvoyant!" But then magicians often say that the more intelligent someone is, the easier they are to fool.

#### 2. Mozart's Symphony No 41 in C Major.

I'd have to have Mozart on the island. Like Beethoven, his music is overpowering. It's got so much to offer. This is the longest and final symphony he composed, and it's difficult to describe its appeal. It's just breathtaking.

I did my National Service with the medical corps in Egypt where I was a sergeant in the Central Medical Laboratory, then worked at Porton Down, growing radioactive bacteria for use in warfare. For protective use, I should add. After that I worked in the pathology lab of Guildford Hospital, then for Pfizer, and then for the

pharmaceutical company May and Baker as Area Manager.

That was when I moved to Droxford in 1960, where I became very involved in local activities, becoming secretary, treasurer and then chairman of the Meon Valley Flower Show, secretary of the local British Legion branch, and treasurer of the village hall.

I was also recruited to the Droxford PCC where I became the Droxford representative on the Deanery Synod. I was also on the Churches Together Committee.

The idea was to try and get conformity amongst the various denominations – the Roman Catholics, Anglicans, the Baptists, Methodists and so on. It didn't work. After a short while it fizzled out.

3. Schubert's Impromptu No 3, Opus 90.

I'm very fond of Schubert's piano music. It's very melodious, very moving. I love it.

I began playing the organ in our churches after the rector, John Beaumont, said there was a vacancy, and as he knew I played the piano he asked if I would step in on a temporary basis until a permanent organist could be found.

That was nearly 50 years ago, I wish they would get a move on and find this new organist!

I had never played the organ before but I soon got the hang of it. It is a very satisfying instrument to play, though there are big differences between the ones in the four Benefice churches. The Exton one can be difficult because

it's got what is called a tracker action. The more stops you pull out the harder it gets to press down the keys. By the time you've got a lot of stops out you can hardly press the keys at all.

The Corhampton one has no pedals, and it's very basic, more like a harmonium, but very good to play. The one at St Andrew's is really nice. They've got an allround sound system with proper loudspeakers, whereas at Droxford, in their wisdom, when they did their renovation they got rid of the very nice pipe organ and installed an electronic one instead. It has just one free-standing speaker which was never designed for an organ, probably more for a disco.

Still, this is the organ I play mainly today, once a month, though I will play the others for special occasions if I'm asked.

## 4. Dove Sono from Mozart's Marriage of Figaro.

I thought I must have some opera on my desert island, and it had to be Mozart again.

This is my favourite of all his operas, and I've chosen the Countess's Aria from the third act, which I find very moving. But I could choose anything from any Mozart opera, and I'd be very happy with it.

Three years ago I nearly died from a very serious heart problem. I realised something was wrong when I was playing the organ at a memorial service in Droxford Church on a Saturday, and it all became a bit of a blur.

I was quite incapable of driving afterwards and had to be given a lift home. Hazel rang 111, and the doctor came and decided that I was probably anaemic.

Fortunately, Hazel had a routine appointment with our regular doctor, Dr Morris, on the Monday morning, and there was no problem changing it to me. It was Dr Morris who promptly rang for an ambulance and shot me into hospital.

Apparently, practically all my organs had shut down. I was watching my

blood pressure on the monitor getting slower and slower. At four o'clock the next morning the hospital rang Hazel and told her to get the family round straight away as I had just a few hours to live.

But I didn't die. What kept me going was my small grandchildren coming in, nattering away, and asking me lots of questions. A week later I asked the consultant "Was I really that ill?" His answer was "You were teetering" and he wrote it up as a miraculous recovery.

I know that, led by Rev'd Tony Forrest, a lot of people had been praying for me. Did that have an effect? It would be nice to think so.

#### 5. Hallelujah Chorus.

I thought a piece of choral music would be nice to have belting out on the island, and you can't beat the Hallelujah Chorus.

A couple of years ago I was involved in a car accident. It wasn't my fault, but a young policeman made me take an eyesight test there and then, and I mistook a P for a B, and that was it, I lost my licence. But later I had to have a cataract operation and afterwards my vision was absolutely fine.

I wrote to the DVLA saying my eyes were now perfect and asking for my licence back, but nothing happened. This went on for a year, with me forever ringing them and sending them letters and emails. Then someone in the village suggested I should contact our MP, Felicity Drummond. I did, and within 48 hours she'd got it all sorted and I'd got my licence back.

#### 6. Lil' Darlin' from The Atomic Mr Basie.

This is a delightful jazz record. For a long time, probably into my thirties, I was very narrow-minded and thought classical music was it. Then I got friendly with a schoolmaster who was a great jazz fan and he sat me down, put on a track from this album, and said listen to these trombones, these clarinets, these trumpets.

He totally converted me, and I started going to the jazz club at the Dolphin in Botley where they had great American stars like Dave Brubeck and Buck Clayton. I was never really up to playing jazz myself because I always need the dots in front of me, so I have great admiration for people who can play without music.

One of the worst things about growing old is losing your friends. We used to know six couples, and we'd meet for lunch and so on, but now there are just four of us: me and Hazel, and a widow and a widower. One by one the others have all fallen off the perch. It's no fun growing old.

#### How would I cope on the island? I

think pretty well. I was an only child and I would be quite happy with my own company.

The one record I would save from the waves: Beethoven, because it's such a majestic, towering work.

The book I would take: The collected works of PG Wodehouse. He was one of the finest humourists of our time, and one of the greatest users of the English language. The way he used words and language was sublime.

Luxury item: A solar-operated organ.

# Planting for next year

One of the more pleasant tasks at this time of year is to leaf through the seed catalogues that have been coming in the mail, and to think about what to grow in the garden next year.

Vegetables: Plant winter and spring lettuce and spring cabbage as well as autumn sown broad beans and onions. Clear and dig over vacant ground in the vegetable plot and incorporate some well-rotted horse manure to improve the soil texture.

Keep winter vegetables free from weeds and any debris to avoid fungal disease and the accumulation of pests. In small gardens, areas to be left vacant till spring can be covered with weed control membrane. This prevents weeds growing whilst allowing rain to permeate into the soil. It also has the benefit of warming the soil up quickly in the spring.

**Fruit:** In November plant bare-rooted raspberry canes and soft fruit bushes, ensuring that plenty of well-rotted manure is incorporated under the roots, and that the roots are well soaked before planting.

Start winter pruning of fruit trees but do not prune cherries, peaches, nectarines, plums or damsons because the wounds heal slowly and



lay the trees open to diseases such as "silver leaf". Do not be tempted to cut back autumn raspberries even when they have finished fruiting. Leave this until February.

Herbaceous border: Divide and replant clumps of perennials such as Michaelmas daisies, phlox, border campanulas, rudbeckia, Echinacea.

**Trees and Shrubs:** Plant bare-rooted specimens of trees and shrubs in November or even later, remembering to soak the roots for about an hour before planting. Lightly prune shrubs and roses when they have finished flowering and clear up all fallen leaves to reduce the spread of black spot.

**Bulbs:** Plant spring flowering bulbs, remembering to plant them deep

enough to protect against frost, mice and squirrels.

**Lawns:** Most lawns are recovering from the dry weather of early summer, but it is always good to scarify lawns at this time to get rid of thatch and moss before applying top dressing, and re-seeding any areas that have not recovered from the summer.

Do not allow fallen leaves to lie on plants or lawns as this will encourage fungal disease and provide shelter for unwelcome guests such as slugs and snails.

This is also a good time to carry out maintenance on fences at the back of borders before bulbs begin to appear. Use pieces of board to stand on when doing work in the borders as they help to distribute one's weight, thereby avoiding soil compaction.

In the greenhouse: Clear out all the plants such as tomato and cucumber. Wash the inside with a dilute solution of disinfectant and ensure that the glass is thoroughly cleaned. Bring in plants that need protection over the winter.

# 'Friday Boy' Frank loses his battle with cancer



Frank Johns sadly succumbed to cancer last month, a disease he had already beaten to become one of the world's longest-surviving pancreatic cancer patients.

He had lived in Chestnut Rise Droxford with Jean Steel for 14 years. Jean told The Bridge, "I and the family would like to thank neighbours and friends who have sent cards, letters and offers of support since Frank's death.

"Everyone has been so kind and caring, which has been greatly appreciated."

It was eight years ago that Frank was diagnosed with nonoperable pancreatic cancer, and told he had just four months to live. But a new drug was being tested at the Royal Marsden Hospital, and he was given the chance to join 100 others in a world-wide trial.

It was completely successful, and he was given the all clear.

Alas, in late 2021, having cleared that hurdle, he was diagnosed with an unrelated colon cancer. Although given a prognosis of only 18 months, he was determined to beat it again, or if that wasn't possible, to work hard raising funds for cancer research.

So, as a member of the 'Friday Boys' - a group of 12 locals who meet up socially to cycle each Friday - he persuaded them to do sponsored rides, and in just one year they had raised over £15,000 for research into the disease.

His friend and co-cyclist David Neale told The Bridge, "When Frank's colon cancer spread in July he spent a month in QA Hospital, before being moved to Rowans Hospice.

"It's extremely sad that having battled and won the fight with pancreatic cancer, the colon cancer crept up on him and overtook his determination. He was inspirational and we'll all miss him."

# So many hills... we cycled nearly twice the height of Everest!

Alastair Jones of South Hill, Droxford, and Andy Holt of New Road, Meonstoke, spent two weeks during the hottest June on record cycling the length of the country to raise money for, respectively, the British Heart Foundation and Parkinson's UK.

#### Alastair has written his account of the journey for The Bridge:

With five of our close friends we completed the ride from John O'Groats in Scotland to Land's End in Cornwall in just 14 days, covering 1,014 miles and 16,800 metres of climbing – that's nearly the height of Everest, twice!

With just under 80 hours of time in the saddle, and 310,000 pedal strokes, you can imagine the sores!

A couple of our accompanying friends got heat stroke as well, but we all rallied round and pulled together. After a year and a half of planning and training there was going to be no question of giving up!

It was an incredible adventure, in which we experienced wonderful views and landscapes, including the Lochs and Munros of the vast Scottish Highlands, the Lake District, and the endless interconnecting canal networks of North West England.

Then there were the Welsh Marches and their beautiful market towns, the

dramatic winding road through Cheddar Gorge, and the rugged Cornish coastline.

The hardest part was the Lake District with its steep climbs, where we had to take a 20-mile detour because one of the mountain passes was closed.

A really special moment was to find several of our family and friends at the end waiting to greet us, including our wives, Beth and Alice. We couldn't

have done it at all without their support.

Looking back, it seemed a crazy undertaking, but it was all in aid of two special causes close to our hearts.

I raised over £3,000 for research into heart disease in memory of my father, Rhys, who passed away suddenly in 2020, while Andy raised £1,400 for research into Parkinsons, in memory of his grandfather Philip who suffered from this awful disease.

#### Andy added:

We had previously done a few days cycling to Plymouth, and needed something even more challenging, which is why we decided to do this.

The hardest part was towards the end, with the hills in Cornwall. The most enjoyable was going through Cheshire when I stopped off in Northwich where I was from, and to see my old school and the house I was brought up in. A real trip down memory lane.

Would I do it again? If I did, I would like to do it the other way round, south to north. But that will have to wait because at the moment I've got my hands full with our baby boy. Maybe one day...

# News from Kyiv

After living in Droxford for 18 months and making many friends here, Ukraine refugees Angela and her husband Volodymyr, and their teenage children Viktor and Valeria, have had to return to Kyiv somewhat sooner than planned.

Angela is a technical assistant in the country's agricultural industry, and in June the Ukraine government requested her to return in order to coordinate a study into the state of the irrigation system after the destruction of the Kakhovka dam.

She has now written to The Bridge from Kyiv to thank the people of Droxford and surrounding villages for welcoming her and her

family so warmly, and helping them to settle here after their traumatic experiences at the start of the war; and also to thank Lyndsey and David Shepherd for hosting them in their Manor House annex.

#### My dear British friends!

It will soon be two months since our family returned home to Kyiv. The decision to return was not an easy one for us. However, back here in Ukraine, there are relatives who need our presence, as well as my work, which was impossible to do remotely.

Kyiv, at first glance, looks like a completely safe and pre-war city... the shady parks, many children, a sea of delicious fruits and vegetables, summer cafes and restaurants full of visitors, traffic jams - such a dear and beloved Kyiv.

And sometimes I catch myself thinking that there is no war, and all our trials are just a bad dream.

But the periodic air raid sirens, loud air defence work (Glory to our air defence!), the huge Dnieper River without a single ship (navigation is prohibited because of the war), soon bring us back to reality.

Then there's the military on the streets, the sight of young guys with prostheses, the constant news that Ukrainian civilians are again being killed, and that not all Ukrainian cities are reliably protected from shelling, rocket and drone attacks... it doesn't add optimism! However, life goes on and we must learn to live with the new realities.

I remember watching the receding white cliffs of Dover from the ferry. They're really beautiful, and I miss

England, the ocean, the lovely cities, but the main thing is you, my English friends.

We did not expect the British to be so open, kind and hospitable. You are the most beautiful people in the world (after the brave Ukrainians, of course!).

During our year and a half of living in England, we found new wonderful friends and relatives. It turns out that this happens in life, when completely unfamiliar people become as close and dear as native people.

Dear Lindsey, David, Elliot and Eve Shepherd, our hosts, you are the best relatives that could be dreamed of. I cannot put into words all my feelings and great gratitude. I only dream that we will often meet, hug, and see how our children and grandchildren have grown.

I can't help but write about Father Tony too.

It was the first month of our stay in A England when we came to the church



service, and from that moment it was such a huge support for us.

Father Tony did everything to make us feel at home. He included prayers in Ukrainian, and at the end of the service there was always the anthem of Ukraine.

I would like to write more about the dozens of people who supported us while we lived in Droxford. My dear Yvon, yoga instructor, you are the best. My husband's colleagues also became his best friends. They are constantly in contact. The guys are worried about us.

I cannot fail to mention as well the excellent Swanmore College, which took our children in and provided them with full support and the best conditions for education.

Dear sweet Droxford, your green fields, tall trees and the clear waters of your streams will always be in my heart. It was here I first saw fields of snowdrops, it was beautiful.

My dears, everyone who knows and remembers us, THANK YOU so much for your support and kindness. Take care of yourself, take care of your loved ones, take care of the blessed land on which you live. And most importantly, believe in our Victory, because it cannot be otherwise; we are on the side of good. We'll definitely see you again! We strongly embrace you all.

via NHS 111 as this will reduce your waiting time on site.

Patients who go directly to the UTC without calling 111 will be clinically assessed by a triage nurse or other health professional, and will only be prioritised for treatment over booked appointments when clinically necessary.

# Potholes: we're making record progress

I hope everyone has had an enjoyable summer. The weather has been rather changeable, and my fingers are crossed at the time of writing for the harvest as well as our local wine makers.

The rain and storms we have had remind me of the damage caused to our local roads earlier in the year by the deluges then.

Hampshire County Council has been making progress in dealing with these across the county. It has pledged to spend an additional £7.5m a year over the next three years to fix thousands more potholes.

This is on top of the £13.5m currently spent a year on reactive pothole and road defect repairs. In fact road defects are being fixed at a record rate. In May and June alone 19,697 potholes and other problems were repaired, and

I am pleased that no schools in Hampshire have had to be closed over RAAC concrete safety fears. In fact, only Cranbourne College in Basingstoke has been identified as being at risk, and temporary works have been undertaken to make sure it is safe.

# But much more is still needed


33,671 square metres of surface design and micro asphalt were laid.

We need to see more progress locally though. Lately the Morestead Road in particular was going from bad to worse, as anyone who has had a puncture there would attest. Having made a lot of fuss about this I am pleased that many of the potholes have now been repaired.

#### Cycle access routes

Two unrelated bits of road news. First, the county and city councils are working together to develop a local cycling and working infrastructure plan (called an LCWIP).

There will be a consultation later in the year on the plans. From a look at some initial proposals, the railway line (sorry, the Meon Valley Trail) will probably feature strongly but we need to make sure the access routes are kept open



and not overgrown with nettles or impassable in winter.

Separately, HCC are promoting tree planting beside highways, as part of its tree-planting programme to plant one million trees by 2050.

The project's slightly dubious name is "Shoots along the Routes." More details can be found at *hants.gov.uk/ hampshireforestpartnership*.

Hambledon are looking at working with the council on this on one of their approach roads. Worth a look if you are considering this.



#### Another chance to register for the Council's solar panel bulk buying scheme

A reminder that residents can join in the bulk buying of solar panels or batteries for their homes, which both reduce energy bills and boost local renewable energy generation.






