Droxford is awarded Best Small Village in Hampshire

Janet Melson, Chair of Droxford Parish Council, writes:

In September, Droxford was awarded "Best Small Village of the Year, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight". The competition is run annually by Hampshire Association of Local Councils (HALC), and after considering fully the number of community initiatives and many activities that take place in our village, the Parish Council decided to enter for the first time.

The entry form was submitted in July and the judging panel visited the village on a sunny Wednesday morning in August.

The Parish Council was subsequently invited to attend the awards ceremony, hosted by last year's winning village of Odiham.

With no experience of the event, Ailsa, our Parish Clerk and I attended, more out of curiosity than expectation.

The first award to be announced was for "Best Open Space". We were delighted when Droxford was announced as the runner-up for the improvements made to the heart of the village through the resurfacing of The Square and creation of the Garden of Reflection.

We immediately felt that our journey to the north of the county had been justified as we sat back to enjoy the remainder of the evening, gleaning ideas for future initiatives from some of the presentations given.

When the category of "Best Small Village" was announced and the opening words of our submission were read out, it was clear to us that Droxford was to be declared the winner!

I'm sure we had broad, but slightly shocked smiles on our faces as the rest of the county was treated to a summary of all that marks out our village and community.

As residents, we all know that there is much to love and enjoy locally, but to be assessed so highly after scrutiny by the judges gave independent confirmation.

A couple of weeks later we invited the



village to join the Parish Council in a celebratory drink and it was great to be joined by so many local people whose input to the village contributed to the award, many of whom were unaware of the full scope of activities that take place.

The application upon which the award was made is now on our website for all to read in full and the final paragraph summarises why Droxford is special:

"A settlement has existed in Droxford since Saxon times and its proud history is well documented. Droxford today is far more than a collection of buildings that have arisen over the centuries. The number and variety of the range of activities that take place are possibly

disproportionately large for the size of the population. The concept of community can be nebulous, but it is clear that Droxford has a thriving, supportive, inclusive and outward-looking community, deserving of recognition as a true Hampshire gem."

or a cash box if you prefer on the night.





Gregor Logan: child prodigy who became a top financier

Gregor Logan, who died suddenly in September aged 68, was described at his funeral as a 'lynchpin' of local church and village life.

Two of his closest friends were Meonstoke's Chris Ellis, and his Best Man at his wedding, Alasdair Douglas. Here they write about his life and remarkable achievements.

Many will remember with fondness Gregor's vitality, and the enormous part he played in village life.

As the chair of Friends of St Andrew's and Corhampton Churches (FOSACC) and treasurer of the Parochial Church Council, he was always wonderfully helpful, and always on the lookout for ways to enhance our churches.

As well as getting everyone organised

to keep the Corhampton churchyard looking so good, he played a major part in the 1,000 year celebrations of this beautiful Saxon church.

Whatever Gregor was involved in, whether it be church life, art exhibitions, or the Jubilee and Coronation celebrations, he was usually to be found in the background quietly helping to make all these things



happen.

You couldn't fail to notice and admire his talent and energy for getting things done, helping out and helping people to help themselves.

'A relentless village organiser'

Some will be unaware, though perhaps not too surprised, that Gregor had been something of a child prodigy.

At the age of just 16 he was admitted to Edinburgh University to study law, where he had to wait until his second year before he could legally buy a beer (although that didn't deter him).

After graduating with an LLB he won a coveted apprenticeship at the prestigious Edinburgh law firm WJ

Burness before joining the world of finance instead, with the Boston asset management company Fidelity, eventually to become its European Investment Director.

On leaving the company 15 years later to join MGM Assurance, he was amused to find he had made it into the Times business pages under the headline "City of London shocked at Logan's departure from Fidelity."

Gregor met his wife Sue on a tennis holiday in 1991 and they bought The Barn in Meonstoke in 1995.

Over many years he and Sue supported countless village-related events, and many of us benefitted from his relentless organising of lunches, bridge sessions and tennis matches.

He was an enthusiastic cyclist as well, and he organised numerous group cycling expeditions here and abroad with cycling friends. Tragically, it was while cycling up Beacon Hill that he unexpectedly collapsed and died.

Gregor had a unique ability to make and keep friends, blind to background, rank or status, and gave freely of his time to help and support friends, and children of friends, with introductions, job experience and guidance.

He gave generously to local charities, and to the University of Edinburgh law faculty to help students who might, without financial support, have been unable to attend.

Those who knew him well, loved and admired him.



Desert Island Discs

8. Lorna Allured

Lorna and her husband Ian came to Meonstoke in 1976 and immediately immersed themselves in village life: the church choir, the 1977 Jubilee and the building of the Meon Hall, and have continued to do so until a few years ago when Ian began to develop Alzheimers. Here Lorna looks back over her life and chooses the six records that she would take to the mythical desert island.

I was born in Bermondsey in 1946. The reason was that my father was a policeman and after the war the police were told to go and live and work in the poorer parts of London to help restore people's lives. I don't think my mother could stand it, so as soon as we were able we moved to Bromley.

Choosing six records has been very difficult because music has been such a huge part of my life - from the word go in fact. My father played the organ and music was his passion, and he would lullaby me to sleep by singing the beautiful melody from the slow movement of Beethoven's sixth symphony - the Pastoral. So that would be the first record to take to the island as it would remind me of a very happy childhood.

1.Beethoven's Sixth Symphony

I learned to play the recorder, clarinet, oboe and the piano. I also loved singing, especially in choirs. As a teenager I sang in an amazing youth choir called the Orpington Junior Singers, and one year we won the prestigious *Let the People Sing* international competition. We also sang at the Royal Albert Hall, and at Sir Arthur Bliss's birthday party in the Stationer's Hall. But the real highlight was singing Mahler's Third Symphony in the Festival Hall.

2. Mahler's Third Symphony

After school I had a gap year and worked at the BBC as a junior secretary

in the Engineering Department which was a very growing-up experience, after which I went to Christ Church College Canterbury to train as a teacher. There I studied music and education and sang in a chapel choir every day, hence my love of church music. I then taught in schools in Kent for two years and sang with the Monteverdi Choir in London.

When it comes to the kind of music I like I admit to being a bit of a square really. Early music and baroque are my favourites. Unlike Ian, I wasn't keen on pop music although I did like the Beatles and as a teenager I went to the Hammersmith Odeon to see them. Lots of girls fainted and kept the St John Ambulance people busy. I had to take the next day off from school due to a sore throat from screaming. I've chosen Hard Day's Night to remind me of my mad youth.

3. Hard Day's Night

Ian and I had known each other since we were 13 when he moved to Bromley from Norfolk. We were at the same youth club and Ian sang in our church choir. We went out together later on until he went to University to study history and I went to Canterbury.

We got together again after three years and things became more serious, and we married in 1972. I had to get used to a very different name which could be pronounced in lots of ways!

lan had by now decided to go back to



University to study social work. His first job – child guidance in Leigh Park – brought us to Hampshire. We bought a house in Liss, and I taught in a primary school in Petersfield.

In 1973 we decided to put our careers on hold for two years. We let our house, bought a VW van, crossed the Channel and kept going, funding the trip mainly by grape picking in France at the start, before setting off through Europe, and then Greece, Turkey, Syria, Lebanon, Iraq, Iran and Afghanistan.

We met some terrible weather as we neared Albania and our van had to have snow chains all the way to Kabul, where we had a bizarre experience. While people were living in terrible poverty due to war we were invited to a champagne evening of Tudor recorder music at the American Embassy. Enjoying such luxury when just a few hundred yards away people were suffering such awful misery made us feel somewhat quilty.

We drove down the Khyber pass and the temperature became increasingly hot through Pakistan, Nepal and India, where our van was hoisted onto a boat which took us to Penang. We had a wonderful time driving around Malaysia and Thailand, and when we arrived in Singapore the van was loaded on to

another boat, this one bound for Australia. When we arrived in Perth our van and all its contents had to be steam cleaned before we could set off for Adelaide. This included the cosy but extremely smelly Afghan coat I'd bought in Kabul.

After a five-day drive across a very rough Nullabor Plain we arrived in Adelaide where we stayed for nine months, Ian doing social work and me teaching, and we thoroughly enjoyed exploring Australia in our van. We loved Australian bush ballads and to remind me of this wonderful time in our lives I would like to take *Click go the Shears*, *Boys*, an 1800s sheep-shearing song.

4. Click go the Shears, Boys

We sold the van to pay for the journey home and after a short holiday in New Zealand returned, much to our parents' relief, to Liss, where Rachel was born in 1975. We stayed in Liss for a while but as we needed more room, and Ian worked at Southampton General Hospital, we bought our lovely King's Farm at the top of the Buck's Head Hill. We loved Meonstoke and soon got involved in village life – the playgroup, Meonwara, tennis and music making – and Ian became secretary of the Meon Hall building committee.

Our son Ben was born in 1978 and life was great, with cats and a lovely Labrador called Smiley, and above all super friends and neighbours. Ian and I enjoyed singing in the Church choir. He had a good bass voice and in his youth had sung the solo part in the carol *Three Kings from Persian Lands Afar*, so I'd like to take that to the desert island too.

5.Three Kings from Persian Lands Afar

I taught in several schools in Hampshire for many years, and organised choirs, recorder groups and orchestras before retiring so I could spend more time with my elderly mother who lived in Petersfield. My teaching skills came in handy six years ago when I was



delighted to be asked by West Meon Theatre to direct the singing for their production of the Pirates of Penzance.

This was quite challenging as I was faced with around two dozen people, most of whom had never sung a note in their lives, and I had to get them singing some quite tricky Gilbert and Sullivan songs in four-part harmony. One of them told me afterwards that he couldn't believe we'd managed it!

I have continued to sing in various choirs in Petersfield and played in a recorder consort with some local friends, calling ourselves the Ladybyrd Consort. An amazing experience was conducting a *Come and Sing the Messiah* in Meonstoke Church a couple of times. The church was packed, and the singing was fantastic on both occasions.

Just for a change I worked during one Christmas period in Marks and Spencer in Hedge End, and then spent some afternoons working in our village shop, which was hard work but great fun. Ian had also retired, having had a long career in mental health, and as a Magistrate on the Fareham bench. He enjoyed playing tennis, watching football and cricket, and became a sidesman in Winchester Cathedral.

So life in Meonstoke for 47 years has been a very varied and interesting time, what with Jubilees, fundraising activities, drama and musical events, wild flower festivals and the 'Pop In' group. We now have four grandchildren who enjoy coming to

stay here. They particularly love the village shop and the recreation ground. We have all been very fortunate and privileged as a family to have grown up in this lovely place, and been been part of such a vibrant and happy community.

About ten years ago Ian was beginning to show signs of Alzheimers. He set off for Norwich one day to see the Canaries play but came back very early because he had got lost – not like Ian at all. So just over four years ago we decided it would be easier for us to live in a more modern house, and we moved to de Port Heights.

With his Azheimers having reached an advanced stage, Ian is now in Kitnocks House Nursing home in Curdridge, and we miss him so much. Something wonderful does happen occasionally though, when now and again he listens to music and his toes start tapping. It's very sad of course, but people have been really supportive and kind, so I'd like to dedicate my six musical choices to all our friends in the Bridge parishes and wish them all a merry Christmas.

6. Monteverdi vespers 1610

My last record is the Vespers of 1610 by Monteverdi, which will remind me of all the fun we have had as a family on lots of holidays in France and Italy. One day I would love to hear this in St. Mark's in Venice.

How would I cope on the island? Well, having been in the Girl Guides I suppose I could try lighting a fire by rubbing two bits of wood together. We were also taught semaphore, so if a ship came passing by I could sign for help by waving palm leaves.

What record would I save from the waves? Definitely Monteverdi.

My book? I've always loved poetry, so it has to be the Oxford Book of English Verse.

And my luxury item? A solar-powered radio, and hope for sunny weather.

The final jobs of the year

The wet autumn has delayed many garden tasks, such as planting bulbs, trees and shrubs. If you have bare rooted trees waiting to be planted make sure that the roots don't dry out, either by heeling them into the ground or potting them up until they can be planted.

Early December is the last chance to plant most spring flowering bulbs and you may still have to give the lawn a final cut.

Now is the time to have a final browse through the seed catalogues for next year before ordering, and in some cases, sowing seeds.

Vegetables Sprouts, leeks and winter cabbage can be harvested but keep the vegetable plot free of weeds and debris that can shelter pests. If you have not already done so you can still sow broad beans suitable for autumn sowing.

Prepare the site for next year's runner beans by digging a trench and incorporating some well-rotted manure and shredded paper before replacing the soil. This will retain moisture in the soil and hopefully avoid the need for watering when the crop is developing.

In January first indoor sowings of early



cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce such as Little Gem can be made.

Fruit Cut back newly planted bushes and canes of soft fruit such as raspberries, blackberries, gooseberries and red currants.

Carry out winter pruning of established apple and pear trees and soft fruit bushes, currants and gooseberries. But do not prune stone fruits such as cherries, peaches, and nectarines, plums and damsons in order to avoid fungal attacks such as silver leaf and canker.

Herbaceous border Now is the time when you can cut down the old flowered stems of perennial plants such as Rudbeckia, Echinacea, Michaelmas daisy, phlox and golden rod. Do not be tempted to cut down penstemons as they can be vulnerable to frosts if the crown of the plant is left unprotected; leave it until late April to do this job. Divide and replant larger clumps of perennials.

Trees and Shrubs Prune Wisteria and shrubs grown for their foliage colour such as Sambuca and Cotinus. Prune deciduous trees to shape.

Plant bare rooted roses, if you have not already done so. Cut back very tall buddleia, roses and lavatera by about a third to avoid wind damage over the winter months. Final pruning should be delayed until spring.

Protect roots of tender perennials such as canna, dahlia etc. that have been left in the ground to overwinter with well-rotted manure or coarse compost.

In the greenhouse Take care of overwintering plants by keeping them fairly dry, clearing up all fallen leaves and dead flowers, and keeping a constant watch out for pests and diseases, particularly fungal rot and mildew. January is the time to sow chillies and peppers, which need a long growing season.

The Centre also extends a warm welcome to people of all beliefs – or who may have no traditional beliefs, but still have an interest in spiritual reflection –


with short courses, retreats, days of prayer, and training.

'I was terrified!'

It's not everyone who would want to jump out of an aeroplane three miles up... and at age of 62, and *especially* when you are scared of heights. But that's what jewellery maker Deborah Hemsworth, of Midlington Road, Droxford, decided to do in order to raise £1,300 for charity.

Would she do it again? Find out from this account she's written for The Bridge.

I got the idea of doing a sky dive after watching the footballer Graeme Souness talking on television about a 14-year-old Scottish girl suffering from Epidermolysis Bullosa, which is a rare and incredibly painful condition causing the skin to tear or blister at the slightest touch.

I was in tears because it was so moving, and I told my husband Robert I was going to do a skydive to raise funds for Debra, the charity that carries out research into it. (I had to admit that the name rather appealed to me too!).

He said, "But you don't like heights. You get a nosebleed just walking up the stairs!" Nevertheless I signed up with the Salisbury company GoSkydive, and persuaded Robert to do it with me.

The training began with a simulation in which we put on a jump suit and harness, and were then hoisted up into the air to be told this was how it would feel like while we were doing it for real. It didn't!

When the time came I was strapped to my instructor, a Spanish guy called Miaz, who told me not to worry as he'd done this over 3,000 times before.

That still didn't help my nerves. You're

sitting there in the plane, you know it's coming and you've got yourself all prepared. Then suddenly the door opens, he gives you a push and that's it, you're out, freefalling.

That first 30 seconds was the scariest part because it was noisy and windy and you could see the ground coming closer towards you.

Then he taps you on the shoulder and you put your arms out, and he opens the chute. And that's when you are supposed to relax and enjoy the experience. But honestly, I couldn't wait to get to the ground.

Landing was quite simple. You just lift your legs up and come in at right angles. I didn't think with these old bones of mine I'd be able to lift them high enough, but I managed it.

Then, after being unstrapped, Miaz did a high five with me and asked how I felt and would I repeat the experience? I said not a chance in hell! Robert, though, loved it and said he'd happily do it again.

The mid-air photos on this page were

taken by Miaz with a camera fastened to his wrist, and I thought I'd put them on Facebook to give everyone a laugh. But honestly, it was terrifying. Between Robert and I, though, we managed to raise £1,375 for Debra.

That was only thing that got me through it, knowing we were helping towards research into finding a treatment and a cure for what is a dreadfully cruel disease.

What happened 40 years ago when 75 'not very good' artists displayed their

work in the Meon Hall?

It was December 1983 and my wife Gerry and I had recently set up the Riverside Players amateur drama group in Meonstoke. We had a play in preparation, but we needed to raise money to buy better lighting for the Meon Hall stage.

Gerry had a friend called Vernon, who could best be described as a "Sunday painter." While the subjects of his paintings were not necessarily to our taste, it was obvious how much pleasure his art gave him.

I naively asked him if he had ever exhibited his work. "Good Lord no," he said, "I wouldn't do that, they're not very good!"

So we thought, how about an exhibition for artists like him? And that was how the *Not Very Good Artists Exhibition* was horn

After widespread publicity (posters, adverts, an interview on Radio Solent, etc (remember, this was the pre-digital era!) we attracted some 75 artists from a wide area, their work including 234 paintings, 16 pieces of sculpture and

other 3D work.

As the exhibits arrived at the Meon Hall on the day before the 'great event,' producing an Exhibition Catalogue was a very last-minute activity involving typing stencils, then turning the handle of a Roneo duplicator for hours on end — anyone remember that? No time to sleep that night!

The artists were invited to contribute a note about their work for inclusion in the catalogue, and many did, often 'tongue in cheek.'

Here's just one description from John Beaumont, the Rector at the time: "In conventional works of art the experienced critic can see the essential message conveyed. In this Wire Sculpture he is able to see right through the work to the very core of 'nothingness' which exists in

the mind of the artist."

To their great surprise some of the artists were able to sell their work, while others offered their art for auction in the late afternoon, with local Southern Television director Steve Wade acting as auctioneer.

Vernon, on seeing his artwork displayed, said, "I can't believe this! It makes me feel proud of my paintings!"

But then as someone once said, "if it's on a wall in a gallery, it's art."

And the best news was that the profits from the event enabled the Players to install four lighting gantries on the walls of the Meon Hall's auditorium, and to convert the sturdy display boards into rostrum units to be used as tiered audience seating for the Players' 1984 production of 'The Prince, the Wolf and the Firebird.'

Well, it's good news! The Rev'd Andy Davis has been appointed to the living at Swanmore. After being licensed on 19th February the search for nonstipendiary or self-supporting priests, who might live in Hambledon, Meonstoke or Soberton, can start.

We all love change in the Church of England, don't we! I think we ought to realise that we are unlikely to be able to go back to the model of the past where we had a priest whom we could describe as 'our own'.

The plan now is for there to be four priests, plus a youthworker, who will all

work across the seven MVPs.

Most of us, in our working lives, play to our strengths, and it is no different for priests. So it might be that one of the four will be more gifted working with young people and others with older folk.

Similarly, one may be happier leading less conventional worship, and another more closely wedded to the Book of Common Prayer.

We will have to wait and see, but in the meantime may I ask you to pray for Andy Davis as he faces the next step in his ministry, and to be prepared for things to evolve?

Alison, at 58, gets her running shoes out again

If you've ever fancied running a marathon, or even a half one, and dropped the idea because you thought you're too old, take heart from Alison Bailey's experience.

At age 58. Alison, who lives in Pound Lane, Meonstoke, decided to get back into training for a half marthon, even though it was eight years since she'd run her last one. She succeeded, and raised over £2,000 in the process.

In April this year my sister suggested that we should run the London Parks Half Marathon in aid of the Anthony Nolan Trust, which supports those affected by bone marrow cancers as well as conducting vital research into their treatment.

It's a charity close to our hearts because without this research our brother Nick wouldn't have lived with Myeloma for as long as he did. He tragically died last year and we miss him dreadfully.

It seemed a good idea at the time. I've completed three Great South Runs and two London Marathons so felt this was achievable. I could jolly my sister Joss along and, as the seasoned runner, would give her advice re training etc.

How wrong I was! I'm twenty years older than I was for my first marathon and it's been eight years since I ran the last one. I swore never again, and yet here I was, starting the painful process of training on the rolling South Downs.

My sister pulled out, citing injury and a lack of enjoyment in the training (I know how she felt), but I ploughed on.

I'm not a natural runner, never have been, built for comfort not speed and with a little more comfort around my waist than I should have. However, I started training in the summer and gradually my legs remembered what running was about and my woefully slow pace started to pick up.

When I say pick up, a small child could have easily out run me at any time!


The longest training run was from

Cheesefoot Head along the South Downs Way back to Meonstoke. I have to confess there was a little walking, some of the hills were just killers but having completed ten hilly miles in under two hours, I felt ready for the big day.

And so, in October, came the big day. The one thing that I hadn't factored into my training was a mini heatwave in October. Whilst my son Fergus was muttering darkly about climate change, I was wondering how an earth I was going to get round in 24 degree heat. It was roasting and at times I wasn't sure I would be able to finish, or at least finish before the end of the day.

The route takes you out of Hyde Park for the first four miles before bringing you up the Mall, Constitution Hill and back into the Park. It's very special to run up the Mall, as well as being nice and shady.

Once back into Hyde Park the route wound back on itself, which made it easier for supporters to see you more than once. I was very lucky to have my partner, daughter, son and sisterin-law cheering me on. Without them I would have struggled so much more



than I did. My time was terrible – three hours – but I did it!

My only gripe was there weren't enough water stations for such a hot day, but the organisation and the crowds who came to cheer us all on, were just fantastic.

The Anthony Nolan Trust had suggested a fundraising target of £350. I am so pleased and proud to say to date the total raised is £2,100.

This is most *definitely* the last run which has the word marathon in it that I will be doing. Thank you to anyone who donated. I am so very grateful.

Recycling: how the booking system is working out

I get a fair amount of correspondence about rubbish disposal. Winchester City Council has been running a survey on recycling habits across the districts. It has now closed but it will provide interesting information as they and Hampshire County Council plan for the future.

We have a slightly odd structure in Hampshire, in that the district councils collect the rubbish whilst the county council disposes of it.

Personally I think that a more joined-up approach would be more efficient and cost effective. In any event, the amount that can be recycled at present is limited by the facilities available.

However, a new recycling plant is being built in Eastleigh which should open up a whole range of opportunities not currently available.

I'm often asked about the need to book visits to the Household Waste Recycling Centre in Bishops Waltham and elsewhere.

The booking system was introduced during Covid to manage safe distancing. It enabled access to be smoothed, avoid queuing and keep visitors a safe distance from other. Broadly it was a success although the booking was not so good.

The whole process was reviewed after the pandemic and it was decided to leave it in place. The main reason was to smooth visits – there were times when large numbers would arrive at the same time (I spent a long time prepandemic queuing at BW), and other times that were dead.

So the main aim has been to remove the queues and this has worked. Major steps have also been made to improve the booking system.

The key developments are same day and repeat visits, as now you can book straight away if there is availability. It only takes moments and you can return. It's not quite at the position before the pandemic without queues but it's as close as they can get it. And although it's not necessarily cheaper than before, it is a lot more efficient.

Others have asked whether the need to book has led to increased flytipping. The evidence is actually that this has reduced, although I'm a little sceptical.

What certainly happened was that as we started to open up after Covid, building activity started in earnest and more building waste was dumped.

What may also have had an impact is WCC bringing in charges for garden waste bins in place of those green



bags, although I'm not sure the bags are much missed.

The government has now announced it will be abolishing charges for using recycling centres. This may help flytipping a bit but will remove another source of income for underfunded local authorities. The lost money will have to be found somewhere else and that may mean service reductions. So we shall see.

Droxford bellringers

You may remember the wonderful article in the Bridge earlier in the year about the Droxford bellringers. I gave a county council grant to help with restoration, and I'm glad to report that with all the funds raised they were able to buy three new ropes, repair the tenor clapper, which was only completed in October, and buy new muffles to quieten the bells on key occasions such as Remembrance Sunday. The sound of the bellringing has been amazing
